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Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2022 marked the beginning of the Lenten Season. The word "lent" means springtime, when the days "lengthen". We use this time of Lent to prepare for Easter. Preparations include fasting, penance and almsgiving to commemorate the death and resurrection of Christ. We ask all families to continue praying for a peaceful resolution to the conflict in Ukraine. We will be holding a special Civvies Day fundraiser on March 10, 2022 to support those impacted by the conflict.

Finally, Friday, March 11, 2022 will be the final day before March break. Classes will resume on March 21, 2022. We wish our community a safe and restful break.

Wednesday, March 2, 2022, Ash Wednesday, marked the begining of the liturgical season of Lent. Lent is the 40-day season of preparation for Easter that ends on Holy Thursday, three days before Easter Sunday. During Lent, Catholics recall their baptism and do penance fasting, prayer, and almsgiving as they commemorate the death

ANTHONY MCLEAN - A MESSAGE OF BECOMING ANTI-RACIST

On February 23, 2022 STR students along with four other YCDSB schools were invited to hear Anthony McLean's message on 'becoming anti-racist.' Anthony used his own experiences from growing up in York Region to living in California, to differentiate between cancel culture and passive cultures, to what he called "creating brave spaces." A brave space is where we hold people accountable for their words and actions, but where we also bring people into the conversation.

Anthony also reminded us that our work in anti-racism is rooted in our faith where we are called to love our neighbours. Anthony McLean is most certainly an example of #BlackExcellence, and we were truly blessed to hear his insights and calls to action.

As one of the Truth and Reconciliation's 94 Calls to Action, in September of 2021, YCDSB mandated that all grade 11 English classes are to be run under the NBE3U1/3C1 curriculum. While we have been optionally running the NBE program for the past five years, this is the first school year when all students across YCDSB will be learning about Indigenous Peoples in Canada through a variety of literary sources.


Chad Solomon

Chad Solomon, of Henvey Inlet First Nation, is an artist, puppeteer, and graphic novelist. His graphic novel series *Rabbit and Bearpaw* focuses of the "Seven Sacred Grandfather Teachings."

While the grade 11 Indigenous Studies English course has been mandated by the school board, the renowned International IB program that runs at St. Robert doesn't have such mandates. As a result, this year IB coordinator, Andrea Steele, along with English department head, Lisa Laviolette have integrated Indigenous content into each grade level of the IB program.

The grade 10 pre-I.B. students and NBE3C1 students are working on separate culminating performance tasks this semester that are graphic novel based. Solomon spent the morning with students discussing the creation of storylines and how to transfer that story in graphic form. Solomon also took questions from teachers and students about his work and the process of creation. He very generously gave the host teacher the thumbs up for a career in graphic novels upon retirement from the teaching field after she shared her creation from the morning's session. As that very host teacher, I can assure you that he spoke more words of kindness than words based in reality. ;)

Grade 9 Pre-IBs join award winning author, Waubgeshig Rice in a nation-wide live stream in preparation for their upcoming novel study of *Moon of the Crusted Snow*. Rice spoke to students across the country about current concerns in First Nations communities as well as the nature of storytelling.

Our St. Robert students were especially excited to have one of their questions selected to be read and answered by Rice during this live session.

Here at St. Robert, we believe it is important to enrich the learning of our students through the inclusion of Indigenous voices as a means to both engage our students and meet the school based requirements of the TRC's 94 Calls to Action. We are forever grateful to our guests and to our admin team who support these learning opportunities.

On *Orange Shirt Day*, a national day of remembrance of First Nations, Metis, and Inuit children who suffered under the abuses of residential school institutions in Canada, grade 11 semester one students of St. Robert hosted informational activities around the school. Their level of sincerity and respect in hosting this event speaks to the values held within the St. Robert community.

OSSLT Updates

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) is administered by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO), an independent agency of the Government of Ontario. This year, the OSSLT will be a computer based online test offered to in-person Gr. 10, Gr. 11 and non-graduating Gr. 12 students. Remote students will have the option/option/option/option/option/option/option/ on March 4, 2022 for more details. Successful completion of this literacy test is one of the requirements to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Ministry of Education has waived the literacy graduation requirement for all Grade 12 students graduating during the 2021–2022 school year.
